1.0ur <u>Leadership</u> - 5:12–13


 The word for "work" Paul uses here has the idea of manual labor, or toil and <u>sweat</u>.

 Paul doesn't say to crown your pastors and elders as kings, but to "<u>respect</u>" them.


• The word for respect means to "know" someone so well that you appreciate their true worth. • Effective *leadership* and effective following translates into harmonious relationships.


We build a confident church by nurturing <u>respectful</u> relationships with our spiritual leaders.











2. Our <u>Ministry</u> - 5:14–15 • The word "warn" here means to "admonish" and it usually refers to cautioning people about destructive and immoral behavior.

 This word "idle" was originally a military word that described someone who was out of formation or who abandoned their post, what we would call AWOL.

 The word for "encourage" here means to "<u>console</u>" or "show tenderness". • If the slackers are the "won't do" people of the church, the timid are the "want to" people.

•The word "weak" here is probably referring to *spiritual* weakness.

•The follower of Jesus is to always <u>seek</u> the good, not <u>echo</u> the evil.

 We build a confident church by getting personally <u>involved</u> in people's lives.

 Ministry is simply serving God's purposes in other people's lives.

3. Our *Devotion* - 5:16–18

 What these three commands all have in common is that they' re all <u>God-focused</u>.

 We build a confident church by enthusiastically <u>embracing</u> God's will in our circumstances. **4.** Our *Direction* - 5:19–22 The word "test" means to *sift* through something, to learn its genuineness, to closely *examine* something, to determine if its real or not.

 We build a confident church by <u>biblically</u> discerning God's guidance. Biblical discernment results in a sense of <u>vision</u>, a sense of knowing what's <u>next</u> for our congregation.

5. Our *Prospects* - 5:23–28

 Sanctification isn't something we're <u>doing</u>—

Sanctification is fundamentally a work of God.

 We build a confident church by trusting in God's faithfulness for our spiritual progress.
