- This is the same Caesar who was credited with creating the Pax Romana – the Roman <u>peace</u>.
- These shepherds were the first evangelists of the Christian era.

- 1. Why Jesus Was Greater Than <u>John</u>.
 a. Both John and Jesus had <u>miraculous</u> births.
- John was born to elderly parents. Jesus was born to a <u>virgin</u> (Lk. 1:27).



- b. Then there are the birth settings.
- Elizabeth gave birth in her home. Mary gave birth in <u>Bethlehem</u> (Lk. 2:4).
- c. How about birth circumstances?
- John's birth was normal. Jesus' birth was humble (Lk. 2:7).

- d. How about their announcements?
- John's birth was announced by Elizabeth. Jesus' birth was announced by an <u>angel</u>. (Lk. 2:10).
- Zechariah sang at John's birth. A choir of <u>angels</u> sang at Jesus' birth (Lk. 2:13).

- Everyone who heard about John's birth was impressed. Everyone who heard about Jesus' birth was amazed (Lk. 2:18).
- Caesar was so powerful, they called him, "August," which means,
 "majestic one."

- Caesar's herald was a human. Jesus' herald was an <u>angel</u>.

- b. And how about choirs?
- Caesar had a choir to sing about his glory. Jesus had a <u>better choir</u>.
- c. And how about claims?
- Caesar was called Savior and Lord.
 Jesus <u>IS</u> Savior and Lord (Lk. 2:11).

- d. How about actions?
- Caesar demonstrated his power by issuing a decree. God demonstrated His <u>love</u> by sending His Son.

- e. How about motives?
- Caesar sent Joseph to Bethlehem to ensure he would pay taxes. God sent Jesus to Bethlehem to ensure He would pay for <u>our sins</u>.

- The God who cares <u>for</u> us, not the ruler who wants things <u>from</u> us.
- Luke is not only saying that this is a
 birth like no other, he's saying, "This is
 a life like no other.

- Today we name our <u>children</u> "Jesus, Joseph, and Mary," and we name our <u>dogs</u> "Caesar."
- · Jesus has to be worshiped.
- He came to <u>give</u> to us, because He didn't <u>need</u> anything from us.

- His name is "Jesus," (in Hebrew is "Yeshua"), which means "Savior."
- · Mary meditated (Lk. 2:19).
- The shepherds worshipped (Lk. 2:20) and told others (Lk. 2:17).
